



MONTHLY IN-CLUB COMPETITION—JUNE - NOVEMBER

The competition shall consist of ONE entry in each of the following classes: One bloom per stem, except for sprays. Groom and fill in tags as if entering a regular rose show. Judges will comment on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choice. The top scorer in horticulture and arrangements will be recognized at the December meeting.

- Class 1—1 Single Bloom Hybrid Tea/Grandiflora
- **Class 2—Single Bloom Miniature**
- Class 3—1 Single Bloom Floribunda
- Class 4—1 Floribunda or Miniature Spray
- Class 5—Specimen, Any Other Type
- Class 6—Rose in a Bowl—exhibition or open—large or small roses—NEW CLASS!!
 - Class 7—Arrangements—Line or Line Mass or Mass—large or small roses

July Rose Tips from Noah Wilson, Holstein Rose Society

Things I will be doing to my roses in July:

- 1. July will be a busy month with my roses to get and keep them as I want them to be. I will keep them deadheaded with all old blooms cut off, being extra careful to seal the cut ends with exterior carpenter's glue.
- 2. Continue to water each week to be sure they get a full inch of water either by rain or by hand.
- 3. Continue to spray with my fungicide choice on a regular basis, and keep an eye out for any sign of spider mites. If any are found, spray them with a good miticide, or wash the underside of leaves off with a spray wand.
- 4. I like to bottom prune my roses in July removing all leaves and unwanted canes up to some 12 to 16 inches high from the ground. This allows air circulation and sunlight to come in. These old leaves have pretty well done their good for the plant.
- 5. After bottom pruning, I will fertilize again with BloomKote and Mills Magic Rose Mix. I will continue with a monthly supplemental feeding of Mills EasyFeed or Fish Emulsion. I also will put Epsom Salt around them, especially those I want more basal canes to come on. As I fertilize I will pull the mulch away from around the rose drip line, place these items in and scratch them into the ground, then pull the mulch back.
- 6. I will add additional mulch as some of the mulch has rotted away, being sure to get a full 4 inches of mulch, which helps keep the moisture in and the ground cooler.
- 7. If I see any light colored leaves, I will add 1 teaspoon Iron Chelate (Sequestrene 330) per gallon of water around the drip line of the bush.
- 8. If I see any Japanese Beetles I will pick them off and place them in a container of water to die. Lately we have not had these beetles real bad. Spraying with Sevin will kill them but, they have to eat enough of the rose to kill them. I prefer to hand pick them.
- 9. Finally I will enjoy my roses and share them with others, and hopefully engage someone to begin the hobby I enjoy; "GROWING ROSES."

BGRS Public Garden Report by Mary Ann Hext, CR

After our discussion last year about BGRS continuing to maintain the public rose garden at RiverWalk Park, I contacted the person in charge of landscape maintenance at Parks & Recreation and told him of our concerns. It seems that somewhere our communications for them to take over the weeding and other maintenance didn't get passed along to the proper persons. Last November, they did bring mulch to the garden and I was able to spread that and mound up around the bushes before winter. In April I pruned back all the dead wood and then a week later Bob and I applied fertilizer and then I got busy with spring projects and forgot about the rose garden. So last week when I visited, I was totally shocked to see how it looked. Saturday I spent 2.5 hours weeding about one-third of the garden and got some help from a homeless man. On Sunday, he wasn't there, but I finished the remainder. It still doesn't look like it normally does when we all work there, but at least the roses are visible.

I talked with the city maintenance person again on Monday and we discussed what can be done. They have over 40 parks to maintain with seven people and are not going to be able to care for the rose garden they way we did.

I told them that we would be meeting next week and we would let him know what we decided. We particularly need to be thinking about what we want to do with the roses since they will not be able to hand weed the Bermuda grass and they can't spray it as it will damage the roses and probably kill them. Most likely we or they will need to remove the rose bushes so if there are any we want to save, we need to decide this and do it before fall.

We discussed us hiring someone to maintain it under our supervision, but it appears that will not be an option. This is all very sad as the garden is beautiful and when we are down there working, lots of people stop and tell us how much they enjoy it. However, most of us are at a point where we are not able to care for it anymore. So think about any possibilities we might come up with. I thought about a school club that might take it over for a service project or maybe another garden club, but I don't know if these ideas are feasible. We will just have to discuss this next week and come to a decision.
